THE OLD GIRLS' ASSOCIATION.

CONSTITUTION AND RULES.

The Society shall be called "The Old Girls' Association of the Oldham Hulme Grammar School for Girls."

The President shall be the acting Head Mistress of the School, and the Secretary shall be one of the members of the School Staff.

The affairs of the Association shall be conducted by a Committee consisting of the President, the Secretary, the Treasurer and fifteen representative members, of whom fourteen shall be elected by the Old Girls, and one by the members of Form Upper VI. Of the fourteen Old Girls' representatives, two shall retire annually in rotation, but they shall be eligible for re-election, and the election shall take place at the December meeting.

Members who, without good cause assigned, absent themselves from committee meetings for two consecutive years, shall be considered to have resigned, and their places shall be filled up at the December meeting at the end of the second year during which they were absent from the meetings.

Full members (i.e., girls who are able to attend the meetings) shall pay a yearly subscription of 2/-. Country members, who are not eligible to attend meetings, shall pay 1/-. Both subscriptions will include the "Record" and all notices of meetings.

All subscriptions are due in December, and may be paid at the meeting. No notices will be sent to any member whose subscription is two years in arrears.

There shall be two meetings of the Association each year—on the Tuesday preceding the School's Annual Entertainment, which is a fixture for the first Wednesday in December, and on the first Thursday in July, with the exception that in alternate years a picnic on the first Saturday in July shall take the place of the summer meeting at school.

During the last week in November each member shall send to the Secretary at least one warm, useful garment for the poor. (Old clothes are also welcome).

The "Record" shall be issued during the Spring Term, and shall be sent to all members who have paid their subscriptions.

The war is still with us, but with the return of spring the signs point to a revival of the hope that before another year has passed the great struggle will be ended and peace restored. Meanwhile, strict economy as to materials and labour is enjoined in all departments, including paper. Our Record this year will therefore justify its title, and confine itself to a chronicle of the happenings of the year as far as we are able to glean them. This will show how well our Old Girls have answered the call to women to do their part, for in addition to their activities which we reported last year, many are now holding posts in banks and offices thereby setting free men for the firing line. But are all doing their share? Are there not still some who, with a little self sacrifice, might yet come forward to take their place in the ranks of British workwomen, for so long as their King and Country need them?

Nor have our Old Girls been spared their share of anxiety and the grief of bereavement. The first married Old Girl to come to our meetings has given her husband to the Great Cause. The deep sympathy of us all goes out to Mrs. Frank Hamer (Elsie Mallalieu) whose husband, Captain Frank Hamer was killed at the Dardanelles while leading his company in an attack on a Turkish position; and to Maud and Dorothy Ashworth, whose brother has given his life for his Country.

The portrait this year is again one which our older members will appreciate. Miss Bott was one of the staff chosen by Miss Foxall on the opening of the School 21 years ago, and her interest in it has never wavered. She left us in 1904 to nurse her mother, who very soon passed beyond the need of a daughter's care. Then Miss Bott became Assistant Mistress in the Central Secondary School, Sheffield. There she met Mr. E. B. Smith, to whom she was married in August, 1908. In March, 1913, they removed to Wells, Somerset, on the appointment of Mr. Smith to the Head Mastership of the Blue Schools in that town. Mrs. Smith finds plenty of scope for her energies in "mothering" her boarders, and in helping the local Red Cross and Refugee Work.

The School attains its majority this year on May 5th. We cannot celebrate the anniversary as we might have done in times of peace, still we may do something to mark the occasion. We know that our Old Girls have many calls on their time and means. and that they are responding well, so that we cannot ask or expect great things. It has however been suggested that if each member would send 21 pence we could raise a fund in aid of some object in which women are chiefly concerned. If all the 250 members on our roll sent 21 pence a sum of just £21 would be raised. what better object could we desire than the Star and Garter Home, Richmond, which is being built and endowed by the women of England for permanently disabled soldiers—the men who for our sakes make the protracted sacrifice of years of suffering and helplessness a harder sacrifice perhaps than death on the field of battle? Contributions may be sent to the Treasurer any time up to the Summer Meeting, or they may be given in at the meeting.

NOTES.

The School has been in great trouble during the last term. Miss Sutcliffe who succeeded Miss De Castro in 1913 did not return after the Christmas holidays, but wrote to say that the cold with which she had begun the holidays had developed into bronchitis, but that she expected to be back the following week. A few days later came a letter from her sister which seemed to cast a shadow of coming separation, and by the middle of February our worst fears were confirmed by the specialist who was called in to see her. For the next five weeks, much as we tried not to wish selfishly that she might be brought back to us from the very Gate of Life, we could not but hope against hope, till in the early hours of the morning of April 1st she passed peacefully beyond the Veil. Those Old Girls who were privileged to know Miss Sutcliffe will remember how from the first day she entered the School we all felt the force of her influence, we could rely so implicitly on her sound good judgment, and no one ever came to her in vain for help or counsel. All she undertook was accomplished so surely and thoroughly, and yet so unostentatiously that few of us knew of the expenditure of time and labour which she gave so ungrudgingly. "It's good enough" was never good enough for her, nothing short of the best attainable ever satisfied her, and the example she set us will long remain with us acting as an incentive to spur us on to do our best as she did.

Miss Gregory is no longer at the Coborn College for Girls, London, she left at the end of last summer term, and was appointed Classical Mistress at the Wolverhampton High School for Girls.

Last year Miss Sharman joined Mrs. St. Clair Stobart's Unit as Ambulance Motor Driver and Masseuse, and shared the dangers and privations of the Serbian army in their retreat during the late autumn of last year. They marched day after day along the roads blocked by the army and by civilian refugees; they camped as best they could at night, once they were within an ace of being captured, at last they reached the coast in friendly territory where they were safe. After a rest in England, Miss Sharman is quite ready and anxious to start again, to go wherever her services are needed. We believe she is at present in London awaiting orders.

Old Girls will be proud to hear that Dora Hudson completed her three years at Somerville College by gaining a First Class in the Final Honours School of English Language and Literature, a position seldom gained under four years and, even then, rarely attained to. We do not compare her with the men, the best of whom have gone to the war, but of the seventeen women who passed, Dora is one of the only two placed in the First Class.

Marjorie Martland has passed the London Medical Degree Examination with Honours in Medicine, and is now M.B., B.S. (London), M.R.C.S., L.R.C.P. She was anxious to join the Scottish Women's Unit for work at their Base Hospital, Royaumont, near Paris, but as there was no vacancy, she accepted the post of Resident Physician at the Victoria Hospital for Children, Chelsea, where forty beds are at present reserved for wounded soldiers.

Dorothy Cliff has gained the B.A. Degree of the Victoria University with Second Class Honours in English and Modern History.

Dorothy Knott is now quite at home at the Victoria University, and is one of their band of Red Cross workers.

Last year Margaret Higgs, at the Oldham Infirmary, won the bronze medal for efficiency in nursing, the only one given during the first year's training. This year she has won the silver medal given to the nurse who heads the list of the junior examinations, she gained 99% of the marks on the anatomy paper, and the examiner said that her paper was worthy of a medical student, and that he considered it the best paper on the subject that had ever been written at the Oldham Royal Infirmary.

Mary Lees was to begin her training as a nurse at St. Bartholomew's Hospital last February.

Florence Harker is a nurse at the Hospital for Crippled Children, Leasowe, Cheshire.

Alice Kent has left Crediton High School, and is now Mathematical Mistress at the Municipal Secondary School, Halifax.

Doris Warhurst is Assistant Mistress at the High School, Settle.

Elizabeth (Cissie) Hall has left the Merchant Taylor's School, Liverpool, and is now at the High School, Chesterfield.
