THE OLD GIRLS' ASSOCIATION.

CONSTITUTION AND RULES.

The Society shall be called "The Old Girls' Association of the Oldham Hulme Grammar School for Girls."

The President shall be the acting Head Mistress of the School, and the Secretary shall be one of the members of the School Staff.

The affairs of the Association shall be conducted by a Committee consisting of the President, the Secretary, the Treasurer and fifteen representative members, of whom fourteen shall be elected by the Old Girls, and one by the members of Form Upper VI. Of the fourteen Old Girls representatives, two shall retire annually in rotation, but they shall be eligible for re-election, and the election shall take place at the December meeting.

Members who, without good cause assigned, absent themselves from committee meetings for two consecutive years, shall be considered to have resigned, and their places shall be filled up at the December meeting at the end of the second year during which they were absent from the meetings.

Full members (i.e., girls who are able to attend the meetings) shall pay a yearly subscription of 2/-. Country members, who are not eligible to attend meetings, shall pay 1/-. Both subscriptions will include the "Record" and all notices of meetings.

All subscriptions are due in December, and may be paid at the meeting. No notices will be sent to any member whose subscription is two years in arrears.

There shall be two meetings of the Association each year—on the Tuesday preceding the School's Annual Entertainment, which is a fixture for the first Wednesday in December, and on the first Thursday in July, with the exception that in alternate years a picnic on the first Saturday in July shall take the place of the summer meeting at school.

During the last week in November each member shall send to the Secretary at least one warm, useful garment for the poor. (Old clothes are also welcome).

The "Record" shall be issued during the Spring Term, and shall be sent to all members who have paid their subscriptions.

CORRESPONDENCE.

For reasons of space we can publish only extracts from some interesting letters received from several of our Old Girls.

Alice West tells how, in Geneva, she and her sisters are working for us and our Allies in various ways, such as helping at bazaars and concerts in aid of the Red Cross, and for the prisoners of war. Alice takes her share of duty at the Dispensaire des Samaritains, one week as aide-infirmière, the next as infirmière, a post which brings with it much responsibility.

Bertha Martland is attached to one of the General Hospitals of the B.E.F., in France. She leads a very strenuous life, rising at 6-15 a.m., and hard at work often till 8-15 p.m. "Splendid work, nothing but real nursing all the time, with the added work of convoys of wounded constantly coming in, and evacuations going out." She says the men themselves are splendid, so cheery and grateful. She considers that there is plenty of scope for V.A.D. Nurses if they know anything. [And if they are thoroughly sound physically, and equal to the tremendous strain. A nurse who falls ill is only a burden, not a help.—Ed.].

Mrs. Lomas (H. Taylor) makes an earnest appeal for workers trained for social service. She describes the sordidness of the homes, so called, in our slums, of the squalor and disease to be found there, where often a family lives, eats, sleeps and works in the one room, and even the bedclothes are pawned for food. She begs for these poor creatures the help of their better educated sisters to teach them to rise above these sordid surroundings. There is a great field open to the social worker whose heart is in the work and whose love quickens her tact. They reap a rich reward when they see some poor woman take heart again, or some ailing child sent to a convalescent home to be nursed back to health and strength.

Eugenia Cooper writes that she is happily settled at Owens. She tells how every moment is fully occupied, that there are extra lectures to get through the work for the first M.B. in March, after which the Medical Course begins in earnest. She is taking her share in the social life of the College by helping at concerts, and we who know how sweetly she sings are sure that she is very welcome there.

Dorothy Brocklehurst, who has returned with her mother to Russia, gives a most interesting account of her journey and of the district in which she lives.

They went via Bergen, of course, and she tells of the splendid scenery between Bergen and Christiania, of the mountains whose summits are clothed in snow; of numerous lakes with wooded shores or bare rocks rising almost perpendicularly from the water's edge, giving a desolate appearance to the landscape. At times when skirting the lakes the railway track on the mountain side is so narrow that it seems as if one must be hurled into the lake below.

Recent railway restrictions in England however, are as nothing compared with the difficulties attending travelling in Russia. They had to book again at Petrograd, and paid a man six shillings to wait his turn for three hours at the booking office, and even then, he got only second class tickets not in a sleeping car. Dorothy continues:—"We were there an hour and a half before the train started and found that there was not even standing room. We went into a first class corridor and found five empty, locked compartments; we had been told that all the places had been taken in the first class. These compartments were taken one by one till only one remained. Three hours after entering the train the guard opened the compartment for us, but mother had to pay sixteen shillings on each ticket and no receipt was given." The compartments were evidently held for the highest bidder.

Her home is in one of the prettiest districts in Russia, there is a beautiful river, woods and forests on all sides with wild fruits and birds in plenty. No wonder that she finds it a great change

from living in Oldham.

They have about 350 beds. The unit is winning golden opinions. At first the lady doctors were received with caution; then by degrees, as their work was seen to stand the test, they were given the most serious cases, and happy indeed are the "Poilus" who find themselves in the gentle hands of the ladies of Royaumont.

Annie Lloyd has passed the London Medical Degree Examination, and is now L.R.C.P., M.R.C.S., and has since been doing some hospital work.

Ada Wormald has been awarded the Royal Red Cross Medal of Queen Alexandra's Imperial Military Nursing Service. She served in Alexandria and on hospital ships during the Gallipoli Expedition. She is now matron at the Government Hospital, Benha, Egypt.

Gladys Cooper has gained the M.A. degree of the Victoria University, 1916, with First-class Honours in French. She was placed first in the First Class, and was awarded a Graduate Scholarship. She is now taking the Training Course at the University, Manchester.

Dora Hudson has gained a First-class in the Teachers' Diploma of the Victoria University, and is now Assistant Mistress at the Bolton High School.

Marion Chadwick has passed the Final General French and Preliminary, Honours Examination in English Language and Literature, Part I. of the Victoria University Degree. She has left Owens on account of her health.
