THE. OLD GIRLS' ASSOCIATION.

CONSTITUTION AND RULES.

The Society shall be called "The Old Girls' Association of the Oldham Hulme Grammar School for Girls."

The President shall be the acting Head Mistress of the School, and the Secretary shall be one of the members of the School Staff.

The affairs of the Association shall be conducted by a Committee consisting of the President, the Secretary, the Treasurer, and sixteen representative members, of whom one shall be elected by the Staff, fourteen shall be elected by the Old Girls, and one by the members of Form Upper VI. Of the fourteen Old Girls' representatives two shall retire annually in rotation, but they shall be eligible for re-election, and the election shall take place at the December meeting.

Members who, without good cause assigned, absent themselves from Committee meetings for two consecutive years, shall be considered to have resigned, and their places shall be filled up at the December meeting at the end of the second year during which they were absent from the meetings.

Full members (*i.e.*, girls who are able to attend the meetings) shall pay a yearly subscription of 2/6. Country members, who are not eligible to attend meetings, shall pay 1/6. Both subscriptions will include the "Record" and all notices of meetings.

All subscriptions are due in December, and may be paid at the meeting. No notices will be sent to any member whose subscription is two years in arrears.

There shall be two meetings of the Association each year—on the Tuesday preceding the School's Annual Entertainment, which is a fixture for the first Wednesday in December, and on the first Thursday in July, with the exception that in alternate years a picnic on the first Saturday in July shall take the place of the summer meeting at School.

During the last week in November each member shall send to the Secretary at least one warm, useful garment for the poor. (Old clothes are also welcome.)

The "Record" shall be issued during the Spring Term, and shall be sent to all members who have paid their subscriptions.

There is always work for willing hands to do, and now a fresh and very urgent task comes to claim all our sympathy and help.

Our special anniversary meeting last year rallied many Old Girls to the School; old memories were revived, old friendships renewed and old lessons remembered, for along with the facts of history and geography and the ability to calculate correctly we try to instil deeper lessons which will remain when those have faded perhaps, and so, often at these gatherings we receive our highest reward when some Old Girl tells us how greatly she values now the training which taught her to play the game.

But if the School is to maintain and extend its usefulness, if many of your own children are to share your heritage, all must be up and doing, for in these post-war days the cost of enlarging the buildings has attained a magnitude which was not dreamed of when more than twenty years ago the need for their extension was not only foreseen but felt.

And of course this extension scheme requires money, a great deal of money, but surely Oldham can produce it. Never let it be said that Oldham is niggardly toward the cause of education.

Yes we are well aware of all the other claims upon us, and of the increased cost of living, and we know that many Old Girls have already responded, as the Treasurer's subscription list will show. But has all been done?

It will be seen by the Treasurer's report that our Old Girls' subscriptions to the building fund have reached about £260. This falls lamentably short of the £2,000 which we hope to raise for the O. G. A. Classroom. We hear that at least four of the Old Boys have given £100 each to their fund. Among all our

Old Girls could not ten be found willing to give a donation of £100 each, or twenty to give £50? We should then have half our Old Girls' Classroom, and others eager to follow such a fine example would quickly provide the rest. Think how proud your daughters will be to be able to say "My Mother helped to build this classroom."

Are we asking too much? I think not. We spend freely on our pleasures and luxuries, and surely the education of Oldham's sons and daughters is a sound investment, a cause worthy of some self-sacrifice, nay, an obligation which we cannot neglect without grievous loss to our children and our town.

Oldham can be generous. Our Old Girls have, in the past, given proof of their generosity, and we are sure that they have only to realise this pressing need to be generous again.

For over twenty years by the strictest economy, the Girls' School has been quietly doing its share in building up a Fund which had just become sufficient for the purpose when the great storm fell upon Europe, and so devastating are its after-effects that the £5,000 so carefully saved is now grotesquely inadequate.

Towards obtaining treble this sum for the needs of the Girls' School alone, Miss Macpherson, the Hon. Treasurer of the Old Girls' Contributions will gladly acknowledge your offerings and collections large or small--the larger the better!

"Collections" we say advisedly. Old Girls are not like Old Boys--actively engaged in large undertakings which patriotically spend some of their profits in promoting the welfare of the town and district. But Old Girls are the daughters, wives and sisters of those who have the management of great wealth, of moderate wealth or of a comfortable competence. Will they not then hasten to point out to their fathers, husbands, and brothers that their Old School is pleading for help, and that she is asking for this help in order to find places for the many girls who are now vainly seeking admission, telling them that each year these applicants increase in numbers and that the School is compelled to turn away even her own grandchildren with the inhospitable cry of "No room! No room!" If all Old Girls will help in proportion to their powers they will certainly achieve the sum needed.

The School's Annual Entertainment in aid of the R.S.P.C.A. was joined to a sale of work for the benefit of the Building Fund; it was determined to devote to the latter all the receipts over £31. In addition to the stalls furnished by the various forms, the Old Girls undertook a pound stall which added to the proceeds the sum of £15.

Badges may be had on application to Miss Evington. As silver has fallen in value it has been possible to reduce the price of the brooches to 5/- which sum must be sent at the same time as the order.

MEETINGS IN 1920.

Friday, July 2nd was a memorable day in the School annals, as on that day we had a re-union of all Old Girls to celebrate the twenty-fifth anniversary of the opening of the Hulme Grammar School. The first part of the time was pleasantly spent in greeting old acquaintances. Then Miss Clark made a speech to welcome all present, and Miss Marjory Lees gave a short address in which she made an appeal for workers for the various charities in the town, and invited Old Girls to join the National Council for Women for the Oldham branch of which Mrs. Eric Claydon (Mary Viner) is Secretary. Then Alderman Middleton made a humorous speech, and songs were sung by Susan Rothwell, Mrs. Cromar (V. Shaw) and Mrs. Leeson (P. Lansdell), and there was a dramatic recitation by Elsie Brierley.

Afterwards all gathered round to sign their names to a letter to be sent to Miss Evington expressing their regret that she was not able to be with them. Among the many present at this re-union was Nellie Neild, the Headmistress of Bury High School. When "Auld Lang Syne" was sung the ring of singers completely encircled the vast space of the Hall, and good-byes were said most reluctantly, when the very happy evening was brought to its close by the singing of "God Save the King."

During the last seven years our Old Girls have steadily increased in numbers but the parcels sent to the poor of Hulme have been as steadily decreasing. Comforts for the men at the front have taken our time and thoughts, and the workers in Hulme have grown more and more anxious as they unpacked our contributions. Last Christmas they voiced their trouble and sent us a special appeal not to forget their great need. This appeal was read out at the School Entertainment and several Old Girls present sent in parcels which enabled us to give rather more help

than in the three previous years. Now that the war strain is over let us remember that these gifts to Hulme represent our collective thankoffering for the happy and helpful years we spent in the School whose building and endowment we owe to William Hulme, who in 1691, bequeathed his lands for the furtherance of higher education.

To the Old Girls we specially look to provide warm clothing, new and old, boots that are good but which the children have out-grown, men's and boys' discarded suits as well as clothes for women and girls, and now that so many Old Girls have little ones of their own, we can venture to put in a word for the old toys and dolls which have been deserted in favour of newer treasures.

Not long ago an Old Girl was in Hulme on business for her firm when a customer, hearing that she came from Oldham, told her about the parcels received, how greatly they were appreciated, how the children looked forward to them and "indeed," said he, "I do not know what would happen if they were forgotten." He added that the children think the people who send all these good things are just wonderful. Then it happened that a very poor little girl came into the shop trying in great distress to cover a doll with her scanty clothing. She explained to others taking refuge from the rain, that a nice little girl in Oldham had sent her the doll and her mother said she must take great care of it as she might never get another and she was to take it out on fine days only, and it was quite fine when she left home and now it was raining and what was she to do to keep her doll dry!

A very interesting letter has come from Mrs. Taylor (Marion A. Chadwick) who is with her husband in Northern Nigeria. She accompanies him on his business journeys for eighty miles up the Niger from Lokoja, and for 300 miles up the Benue, and she gives a graphic description of the discomforts of their temporary resting places.

They had at one period a very trying time owing to the absence through sickness of some of the clerks, and Marion had to fill a gap by running the canteen ; the African " boys " seemed to relish the innovation of a lady as their chief and did their best for the " white missis."

Their journeys are taken on small river steamers ; on some there is a comparative degree of comfort, but on others one is more or less mixed up with the cargo.

She tells of the helpfulness and chivalry of the Englishmen stationed there, and describes the drabness of the conditions under which they live when there is no wife to make a home for them, and what a difference the right type of woman can make. The self-centred woman, unpractical and unadaptable is of course worse than useless.

The climate, however, is trying. Lokoja is not a white man's country, and in the heat one has to exert all one's will power not to yield to indolence. Some old hands stand it well, but many of the ex-soldiers who are going out for the sake of the out-door life are returning in streams, but to those who can stand it, it is a wonderfully enthralling country in which to work.
