THE OLD GIRLS' ASSOCIATION.

CONSTITUTION AND RULES.

The Society shall be called The Old Girls' Association of the Oldham Hulme Grammar School for Girls.

The President shall be the acting Head Mistress of the School, and the Secretary shall be one of the members of the School Staff.

The affairs of the Association shall be conducted by a Committee consisting of the President, the Secretary, the Treasurer, and sixteen representative members, of whom one shall be elected by the Staff, fourteen shall be elected by the Old Girls, and one by the members of Form Upper VI. Of the fourteen Old Girls' representatives two shall retire annually in rotation, but they shall be eligible for re-election, and the election shall take place at the December meeting.

Members who, without good cause assigned, absent themselves from Committee meetings for two consecutive years shall be considered to have resigned, and their places shall be filled up at the December meeting at the end of the second year during which they were absent from the meetings.

Full members (*i.e.*, girls who are able to attend the meetings) shall pay a yearly subscription of 3/-. Country members, who are not eligible to attend meetings, shall pay 2/-. Both subscriptions will include the Record and all notices of meetings.

All subscriptions are due in December, and may be paid at the meeting. No notices will be sent to any member whose subscription is two years in arrears.

There shall be two meetings of the Association each year— at the beginning of December, and on the first Thursday in July, with the exception that in alternate years a picnic on the first Saturday in July shall take the place of the summer meeting at School.

During the last week in November each member shall send to the Secretary at least one warm, useful garment for the poor. (Clothing that has been worn, if it is in good condition is also acceptable.)

The Record shall be issued during the Spring Term, and shall be sent to all members who have paid their subscriptions.

This year we have to chronicle an event which will cause sincere regret to all those Old Girls—and how many are they—who look back on their school years as the valuable seed-time of their lives. After twenty-five years spent whole-heartedly in the interests of the School, Miss Clark has decided that the time has come for her to resign; her connection with the School as its Head Mistress will officially terminate on May 31st.

We who have worked with her for longer or shorter periods know what a strong hold the School has always had on her affections, the prominent place it has held in her life, and that nothing has been too great a trouble where the welfare of the School was concerned. There are few indeed among all those girls who have passed through her hands who are not conscious of her influence and grateful for it, and any who were ill or anxious or needing wise advice in choosing their career knew that they could always turn to her certain of finding help and sympathy.

Many Old Girls tell me in their letters how much they owe to Miss Clark's teaching; a stronger sense of duty, the desire to put their best into all they undertake, thoughtfulness for others, and a readiness to help those weaker than themselves.

The Governors have appointed Miss Bailey to succeed her as Head Mistress. She is at present Second Mistress and Senior Science Mistress at Southend-on-Sea. She holds the Honours Science and Mathematics degrees of the Victoria University.

The Committee of the Old Girls' Association have sent out invitations to all Old Girls whether members of the Association or not, to an At Home to be held at the School on Friday, April 20th from 7 to 9 p.m.

We have arranged for a short meeting intentionally, so as to trespass as little as possible on Miss Clark's time, for she is bound to have an extra pressure of work in these last few weeks.

It may be that some have not received a notice of this meeting, for among Old Girls there is added to the difficulties attending changes of address the further complication of change of name. If any such case come to your knowledge, please make it clear that the omission has been by accident, not by design, and that all are invited.

Work on the new buildings has not yet begun. We are hoping to see signs of it very soon, and as we may be fairly sure of open weather conditions a start will be made before long no doubt.

ELSIE WARDLE.

Since the publication of our last Record we have lost one—dear to very many of our Old Girls—Elsie Wardle, who died on the seventh of August of last year, after a few days' illness.

She was a woman of strong and attractive personality, with many talents and manifold interests.

In the pharmaceutical world she had attained a prominent position; her enthusiasm, her level headedness and desire for conservative progress being just what is needed at the present time. After training under Miss Buchanan, the pioneer of the higher qualification of women dispensers, she qualified in 1905 from the Society's School of Pharmacy, and was first assistant and later chief pharmacist at Queen's Hospital, Hackney Road, London. In the Spring of 1915 she became pharmacist at the Royal Infirmary here in Oldham, her native town, where she remained until her death. She was one of the leaders in the Women Pharmacists' Association, in which she was successively Secretary, Vice-President, President of the Liverpool and Manchester Group, and finally President of the National Association.

A staunch churchwoman, she was representative of Leesfield Church at the Diocesan Conference, taught the Young Women's Bible Class, was Secretary of the Leesfield Girl Guides, and an Associate of the G.F.S. She will be sorely missed in the life of the church, for she devoted herself wholeheartedly to it, giving readily her sound counsel and advice to all who sought it, and ever entering into the joys as well as the sorrows of those about her.

In education too she took her share, and her strong common sense and wide outlook made her a valuable member of the Lees Higher Education Committee.

She was a connoisseur in the sphere of art and literature, her keen and cultured interest in the beautiful, her admiration for ability in others being one of her great charms.

No one appreciated the Old Girls' meetings more than Elsie, for she had a very real love for the school of her early days. How vividly we can recall her wholesome smile, her warm-heartedness, her vitality, her well-considered words, her keen appreciation of the usual—a rare gift!

In character she was all that was good and noble, and she possessed the art of looking for and finding the best in others, so that all who met her held her in esteem and those who knew her loved her. The memory of one who was an inspiration to so many will be treasured by us always. The world is richer for her having lived and we are proud to have been numbered amongst the friends of—Elsie Wardle.

AN OLD GIRL.

The Old Girls have now their first representative in the mission field. Jessie Simmonite has been accepted by the London Missionary Society for service in Southern Rhodesia, and is now Head Mistress of a girls' school at Hope Fountain, ten miles from Bulawayo.

She sailed on September 22nd, 1922, and after a happy voyage, the ship anchored in Table Bay on October 9th. In a letter received at school, Jessie describes her journey, the arrival at Cape Town, the railway route to Rhodesia, the vivid colouring, the clear skies and brilliant stars of that southern land. They passed through Kimberley, Mafeking—names associated with the S. African war—and the Karoo Desert, finally reaching Bulawayo, on October 12th. A ten mile drive brought her to Hope Fountain where her work awaited her.

She was warmly welcomed by her girls and their prefects, and in the evening a concert was given in her honour.

The girls, whose ages range from seven to twenty, are being trained in the usual household crafts, and in addition, dressmaking, basket making and a new craft, pottery. This is the practical manual side of mission work, the adjunct of that higher spiritual work which is to mould the character and destiny of those once savage people. As Jessie describes them, her pupils are by no means savages; they make their own uniforms, they can sing quite creditably English part songs, they are eager to learn and keen to help, and evidently blithe and happy all day long. We wish Jessie long years of happy usefulness in the work to which she has devoted her life.
