THE OLD GIRLS' ASSOCIATION.

CONSTITUTION AND RULES.

The Society shall be called the Old Girls' Association of the Oldham Hulme Grammar School for Girls.

The President shall be the acting Head Mistress of the School, and the Secretary shall be one of the members or exmembers of the School Staff.

The affairs of the Association shall be conducted by a Committee consisting of the President, the Secretary, the Treasurer, and sixteen representative members, of whom one shall be elected by the Staff, fourteen shall be elected by the Old Girls, and one by the members of Form Upper VI. Of the fourteen Old Girls' representatives two shall retire annually in rotation, but they shall be eligible for re-election, and the election shall take place at the December meeting.

Members who, without good cause assigned, absent themselves from committee meetings for two consecutive years shall be considered to have resigned, and their places shall be filled at the December meeting at the end of the second year during which they were absent from the meetings.

Full members (i.e., those who are able to attend the meetings) shall pay a yearly subscription of 3s. Country members, who are not eligible to attend meetings, shall pay 2s. Both subscriptions include the Record.

All subscriptions are due in December, and may be paid at the meeting. No notices will be sent to any member whose subscription is two years in arrears.

There shall be two meetings of the Association each year—at the beginning of December, and on the first Thursday in July, with the exception that in alternate years a picnic shall take the place of the summer meeting at School.

During the last week in November each member shall send to the Secretary at least one warm useful garment for the Hulme Charity. Clothing that has been worn if it is in good condition is acceptable.

The Record shall be issued during the spring, and shall be sent to all members who have paid their subscriptions.

It should, of course, be a design which, like our handsome blazer, obviously belongs to the School, a modification of the new school tie designed by Miss Shaw, the colours of which are navy and gold. You will be interested to know that the school has now a special uniform, navy tunic with white or blue blouse for winter, and for summer, a cotton dress in blue, green or pink Tobralco, made to a design by Miss Shaw.

The young ones entertained us so well last December that it seems a pity to let such gifts lie hidden. Is there nobody who could take the matter up? Perhaps Edith Ashton who produced the play at the winter meeting might be prevailed upon to gather a band of actors, reciters and musicians, and others who, though not performers themselves, would be invaluable in the less spectacular but no whit less essential work that goes on behind the scenes. Where would the great ships be without the stokers? A good secretary, too, is a great asset to any club. So set to work, young members, and see what you can do about it. You will get plenty of fun out of it, and your committee will be relieved of all anxiety as to the entertainment to be provided at our open meetings.

A glance at the Notes will reveal how our Old Girls can step well out of the beaten track when the occasion offers. One of them is now directing the activities of a political association. Will she end by taking her seat in Parliament? One never knows. Another bids fair to be a golf champion. No doubt others are distinguishing themselves; if only they would tell us or if their

THE NET-BALL CLUB.

Clubs can send up any number of players whom they consider to be up to county standard, provided that they do not duplicate any position. A final trial to select the County team is to be held after the two preliminary trials. Any affiliated members are eligible.
